Demographics Strengths

According to the 2013-14 Campus Profile from the Texas Academic Performance Report from TEA the following information describes Canutillo Elementary School.

Canutillo Elementary Schools' (CES) staff consists of 46.4 Professional Staff members. Teachers: 40.4, Professional Support: 4, and Campus Administration: 2. CES also has 14.2 educational Aides, for a total staff of 60.6. 75% of teaching staff is Hispanic, 22.3% White, and 2.5% of another race. CES has 35 female teachers and 5.4 male teachers. CES has 30% percent of the teaching staff with over 20 years of experience, 35% has 11- 20 years of experience, 11% has 6 to 10 years of experience, 22% less than 5%, and 2.5% are beginning teachers. The average classroom at CES has about has an average of 19 students per classroom. The average teacher salary is \$52,032, for professional staff \$55,255, and an average of \$74,766 for campus administration.

Canutillo Elementary School prides itself with having at least 33% of the teaching staff with master's degrees. A very low turn around. Teachers only leave if they retire or move out of town.

Demographics Needs

Canutillo Elemenary School is in need of the following staff to attempt to increase student achievement by 3%.

Due to the square footage of our campus and after school activities we are in need of additional custodial staff. In addition, CES needs more food service support due to our high enrollment of over 600 students. CES houses 2 Special Education units where students have severe physical handicaps; therefore, and additional nurse would help. CES's special education population is at 10.2%. CES AT-Risk population is at 74% and requires additional educational teaching support in the area of reading specialist.

It was decided by the Campus Improvement Committee that the priorities for this campus are as follows:

Administration will attempt to staff CES appropriately to meet the needs of schools' population. This need is addressed in Goal 2 Increase Student Academic Achievement. CES in conjunction with the Special Education Department will hire an additional At-Risk Teacher with State Comp funds (185) addressed in Goal 2 Increase Student Academic Achievement.

Student Achievement

Student Achievement Summary

According to the data Canutillo Elementary School's needs are based on decreasing student achievement in Writing, Science, and Math. CES needs to enhance math and science instruction school-wide across all grade levels. Teachers will attend purposeful staff development in the areas of need to incorporate strategies within their lessons. Teachers will share with their colleagues strategies learned through PLCs. Teachers will also participate in a book study "The Leader in Me," by Covey to promote student leadership. Through parent liaison PAC meetings, CES will inform/teach parents how to assist their children at home. CES will promote academic excellence through student recognition such as AR reading recognition of meeting reading goals and semester dances for A/A&B Honor Roll. CES will also create bulletin boards where students will be recognized for their reading efforts.

CES will continue to provide interventions within the school day through WINN (What I Need Now) time. Three times a week for 45 minutes students will receives interventions from academic tutors, classroom teachers, At-Risk reading teacher, or instructional aides.

Student Achievement Strengths

Canutillo Elementary School uses State Comp (185) to fund academic tutors to assist within interventions within the school day so teaching and learning is maximized. Reading scores have either been at the state level or above in grade 3rd, 4th, & 5th. CES elementary has technology accessible for all students through 2 computer labs, another lab in the library, and mobile carts of laptops for check out. In addition, every classroom has 5 computers. We are in the process of installing and mounting overhead projectors in all classrooms. Arcelor Mittal has made a gracious donation of 10 IPads for 5th graders to enhance math instruction. Programs that have enhanced student achievement are Accelerated Reader, reading A to Z, and I-Station.

Student Achievement Needs

Canutillo Elementary School has identified several academic needs such as: math skills enhanced through multiplication facts recall, multiple step problem solving, and logical reasoning. CES feels that because the standards have changed so does the rigor in the instruction provided to students. Science is an area of need also because our data shows that students struggle with vocabulary concentrated in our English Language Learners. Science school-wide instruction has to increase through consistent daily teaching of science and academic vocabulary enhancement. CES has to educate parents how to assist their children at home. As a school we want to promote academic excellence through student recognition.

It was decided by the Campus Improvement Committee that the priorities for this campus are as follows:

Math and Science training through Curriculum & Instruction and Region 19, addressed in Goal 2 Academic Increase Student Academic Achievement that is purposeful. CES will use Instructional Leadership Team and teachers to train teachers, addressed in Goal 2 Academic Increase Student Academic Achievement. CES will use 255 Title 1 & 185 State Comp funds for staff development and substitutes, addressed in Goal 2 Academic Increase Student Academic Achievement.

School Culture and Climate

School Culture and Climate Summary

Canutillo Elemenatry School reviewed the following reports: 1. student discipline report indicated that student referrals decreased up to 50%. 2. Organization Health Index (OHI) profile is based on the results of continuous annual survey. The focus for 2015-2016 is to increase the levels of autonomy and adaptation reaching an independent level in accordance to the results of OHI. Strength is illustrated with 3 highest dimensions which is in morale, communication and optimal power equalization.

Canutillo Elementary will focus on enhancing No Place For Hate Activities to stress anti-bullying within our campus. CES will encourage more activities that focus on student recognition in all areas such as Honor Roll, attendance, and behavior. CES will have monthly ice cream celebrations for the grade level with the highest attendance percentage.

The staff will participate in a book study, The Leader in Me," by Covey, to promote student leadership.

School Culture and Climate Strengths

Canutillo Elementary school has established a safe environment by the following:

- A fence was installed to keep students safe during the day. The campus was open and located in a central area of Canutillo where the community felt free to cut across.
- After school activities such as Mother/daughter Father/son, Boys and Girls Club, and Chess Club provides students with opportunites to socialize in a structured setting with enriching activities geared towards leadership.
- CES participates in UIL competition that allows Kinder through 5th grade students to show their academic skills in area such as story telling, music memory, computation, maps skills, etc..
- CES participates in a districtwide wellness program where 75% of the staff is part of.

School Culture and Climate Needs

Canutillo Elementary School has expressed school culture and climate needs based on student achievement and school environment through the following:

- CES students' need to become more responsible with school work.
- Through Positive Behavior Support Initiative we need to focus on school-wide and intrinsic motivation.

• Focus on those students that are doing well not only on those that misbehave.

It was decided through the collaboration of the Campus Improvement Committee that the priorities are as follows:

- Enhance No Place For Hate Activities. Addressed in Goal 3 Enhance Student Character.
- CES will increase activities that focus on student recognition in all areas such as Honor Roll, attendance, and behavior. Addressed in Goal 3 Enhance Student Character.
- Possibly revisit the schools mission and vision statements with student input. Addressed in Goal 3 Enhance student character.

Staff Quality, Recruitment, and Retention

Staff Quality, Recruitment, and Retention Summary

Canutillo Elementary School will continue with schoolwide committees to enhance teaching and learning. Through PLCs teachers will collaborate and share best practices. Teachers will also attend purposeful and meaningful staff development across the curriculum. CES will work with C&I to promote Instructional Rounds and professional development through district initiatives such as The Art and Science of Teaching learning goals, academic vocabulary, and proficiency scales. CES will continue with dual language training through the Academic Language Services (ALS) department.

Staff Quality, Recruitment, and Retention Strengths

Canutillo Elementary School has established a professional environment where teachers are highly qualified. CES teachers collaborate weekly through PLCs, where they review data, lesson plan, and share best practices. CES staff attendance overall is 91% attendance per six weeks. Less than 9% absences due to sick leave and staff development. CES maintains their staff year after year with a low turn over. Teachers do not leave unless they retire or move away. CES staff consists for 14 paraprofessionals and academic tutors, whom are also highly qualified. Many have degrees and are certified teachers.

Staff Quality, Recruitment, and Retention Needs

Canutillo Elementary School has determined the following needs to improve the school organization. It has been determined that new staff need guidance. Allowing new staff to observe other teachers.

- More new teacher help orientation and provide a check list.
- Teachers going to observe teachers within the grade level.
- Meaningful and purposeful staff development such as Dual Language, Guided Reading, and creating learning goals.

It was decided through collaboration of the Campus Improvement Committee that the priorities are as follows:

- Assign new staff members a mentor, this need is addressed in Goal 5 Convey and Share a Positive Image to all CISD Stakeholders.
- Instructional Rounds and professional development, addressed in Goal 2 Increase Student Academic Achievement.

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Curriculum, Instruction, and Assessment

Curriculum, Instruction, and Assessment Summary

Canutillo Elementary will re-evaluate WINN time (intervention cycle), to make it more effective and ensure the RTI process is taking place. CES will use their own staff as instructional leaders to facilitate Science and Math training across grade levels through PLCs. CES will look for differentiated instruction training within the region and ask Curriculum and Instruction for assistance in training and attend PLCs. CES will use the Instructional Leadership Team to training staff on current district initiatives such as academic vocabulary and proficiency scales by Marzano.

Curriculum, Instruction, and Assessment Strengths

Canutillo Elementary School has established the following:

- Teachers receives half a day of Extended Planning Time once every six weeks. This time allows teachers to ensure that they are up to par with lesson planning, grades, RTI process paperwork, and more importantly looking at data to drive instruction.
- Teachers are provided multiple sources for assessments. They are teacher created, district/benchmarks, common assessments from the TEKS resources website, and from multiple resources available.
- Teachers have the opportunity to use the team approach to intervention through various resources throughout the school and each other.

Curriculum, Instruction, and Assessment Needs

Canutillo Elementary School has determined the following as needs based on data and staff recommendations.

- CES has to re-evaluate WINN time to ensure we are maximizing instructional time.
- Science/Math training for all teachers to enhance student learning.

Title I

Schoolwide Program Plan

Canutillo Elementary School is a Title 1 schoolwide campus due to 88% economically disadvantaged population, 79% At-Risk, and 50% English Language Learners. Through Campus Improvement Committee (CIC) schoolwide needs assessments (CNA) are addressed in the Spring. Title 1 and State Comp funding is allocated as needed based on schoolwide needs to promote students success through staff development of research based practices, supplemental resources, and staff. Campus Improvement Plan is closely monitored and needs assessments are addressed at different focal times throughout the year. Assessments/ TAPR report /accountability reports are analyzed and a plan of action is developed with teachers and staff. Our campus has various committees to support our students/ staff and community. Committees include the following:

Positive Behavior Interventions Support (PBIS) team- Emergency Operational Plan (EOP) Committee- Coordinated School Health (CSH) committee- Technology committee- Campus Improvement Committee (CIC)- Instructional Leadership Team (ILT)-Parent Volunteers- Parent Advisory Committee (PAC). We are in the process of creating a Parent Teacher Organization (PTO).

Professional Development is a key component to ensure success for our teachers and students. Through the completion of a needs assessment using varied sources of data, the campus analyzes progress or barriers to determine a plan of action to ensure that all paraprofessionals and teachers receive trainings anchored on best practices that are research based providing support to employees assuring high quality instruction for our students.

Ten Schoolwide Components

1: Comprehensive Needs Assessment

Canutillo Elementary School has an established Campus Improvement Committee (CIC) that participates in schoolwide decision making. CIC meets on a monthly basis to discuss current events that need to be addressed as well as celebrated. CIC led in a needs assessment (CNA) effort that involved all staff, ten parents, and ten students. Different sources of data are considered such as the TAPR report, Student Achievement Data Table, Accountability Summary, attendance reports, Index 1: Student Calculation Report, comparison group tables, discipline reports, staff attendance reports, and student and parent surveys. Data is also desegregated through ongoing PLCs to focus on closing achievement gaps and ensuring quality education for all.

2: Schoolwide Reform Strategies

Canutillo Elementary School implements WINN (What I Need Now) intervention block within the school day. During this 45 minute block student's academic needs are being addressed in a systematic approach. Through weekly assessments, progress monitoring is taking place. Through collaboration and staff development best practices will be provided in the following areas:

- PBIS training for bully prevention and positive reinforcements to include No Place for Hate activities.
- Response to Intervention (RTI) to ensure proper processes and procedures following with best intervention strategies to ensure student success.
- PLC's -horizontal and vertical alignment, reviewing data for planning and interventions.
- Core content areas to support all students including ELL, SPED Migrant, and college/career readiness.

3: Instruction by highly qualified professional teachers

All certified staff at Canutillo Elementary School is highly qualified. Teacher certifications vary to include: Bilingual Education, ESL certified, Special Education, Physical Education, Music, EC-4, GT certified, and Generalist. Teacher and staff receive meaningful and purposeful staff development throughout the school year.

4: High-quality and ongoing professional development for teachers, principals, and paraprofessionals and, if appropriate, student services personnel, parents, and other staff

Canutillo Elementary School participates with all district initiatives through Curriculum and Instruction to support student achievement. Canutillo Elementary School holds monthly PAC (Parental Advisory Committee) meetings to educate and inform parents of current events and provide input on topics at hand. Teachers meet in weekly PLCs, grade level planning, and are part of the Instructional Leadership Team. Teachers participate in schoolwide committees that hold Parent Power Nights to educate parents on ideas that would best help their children succeed. Teachers participate in district wide waiver days to receive training on district intitatives such as Learning Goals, Proficiency Scales, and Academic Vocabulary. Teachers will have the opportunity to attend the CAST (science) Conference in Dallas and the CMAT (math) conference in Houston.

5: Strategies to attract highly qualified teachers

Canutillo Elementary School follows all policies and procedures as set forth through Human Resources to hire and retain highly qualified teachers. We will continue to provide professional development for high quality instruction to all our students. Targeted Professional development will provide research based strategies to support our ELL students. The following events/activities demonstrate a goal focused campus for student higher education and opportunities for student success by participating in the following events:

- Career fair
- Canutillo High School visit of Career and Technology Education (CATE)
- Fourth Grade college visit to UTEP
- Fifth Grade colege visit to NMSU
- Generation Texas/ College awareness month
- Staff attendance incentives
- Staff socials/ celebrations
- Staff Wellness

6: Strategies to increase parental involvement

Canutillo Elementary School has a full time Parent Liaison that assists parents with various needs. The parent liaison holds monthly meetings, parent workshops, makes home visits, and serves as a resource to aid parents in time of need. Monthly calendars are sent home through parent liaison and other information that might benefit parents.

7: Plans for assisting preschool children in the transition from early childhood programs to elementary school programs

Canutillo Elementary School has a relationship with the Region 19 Headstart program where our Pre-Kindergarten students participate in a dual enrollment program. Headstart students and parents visit our campus in the Spring to help with the transition process to Kindergarten. Headstart holds parental meetings where CES participates in providing information and attending such events. Headstart students participate in a school visit that serves as an orientation in the Spring. Parents are encouraged to join their children for this event. Visitations are provided to ensure a smooth transition from Elementary to Middle School and opportunities to explore a higher education program.

8: Measures to include teachers in the decisions regarding the use of academic assessments in order to improve the achievement of individual students and the overall instructional program

Canutillo Elementary School teachers participate in weekly Professional Learning Communities (PLC) meetings. Teachers are also given half a day once a six weeks to plan and create assessments. Teachers also receives mini workshops through PLCs in the core subjects and technology where teachers learn different strategies from each other. Data is reviewed to close achievement gaps and provide differentiated instruction. Data is assessed to reteach and provide interventions.

9: Activities to ensure effective timely assistance for students who experience difficulty mastering the proficient or advanced levels of academic achievement standards

Teachers are encouraged to identify students in need of academic assistance and go through the Response to Intervention (RTI) process. Students at Canutillo Elementary have various opportunities to participate in intervention and enrichment programs such as: individual teacher tutoring, WINN time, academic tutors, GT, Rising Stars, Boys and Girls Club, Kids Excel, and Sylvan tutoring.

10: Coordination and integration of federal, state and local services and programs

Canutillo Elementary School's Local funding, State Comp, and Title 1 funding are allocated in unison to provide a research based education for all students based on schoolwide needs.
